
According to *P&C* reporter Jeff Hartsell, Higgins is going big with his recruiting. And by big, we mean huge. Of the 17 recruits for the 2009 signing class, seven are six-foot-two or taller and five weigh at least 275 pounds. Throw in some true behemoths—such as six-foot, 305-pound outside linebacker Jim Knowles from Belle Glade, Florida, and six-foot-four, 275-pound defensive tackle Kyle Anderson from Western Kentucky—and the Bulldogs line will be one tough machine.

Higgins concedes that, last season, he needed a team that was both big and fast, and they came up short, even with a handful of All-Southern Conference players on the field. Now, with an offense and defense deep with talent—and the return of some fifth-year seniors—fundamentals and techniques should be strong, and Higgins is preaching a "back-to-basics" philosophy.

And don't overlook redshirt junior quarterback Bart Blanchard, who'll return to the position after a record-setting sophomore

year, during which the Rock Hill native wrote himself into the record books as The Citadel's all-time leader in single-season total offensive yards with 2,609. He also threw 19 touchdown passes, a stat ranking second in the school's history. Hopefully, with Higgins' new approach and returning veterans, the Bulldogs can lift themselves back to the top of the Southern Conference.



Sield of Dreams: Johnson Hagood Stadium, opened in 1948 and purchased by The Citadel in 1963, recently underwent a \$40-million renovation, which added new grandstands; an enhanced press tower; skyboxes, luxury suites, and a club lounge; and two large outdoor club-level terraces overlooking the field and the Ashley River. Another interesting fact? The Citadel now boasts the largest scoreboard in the state of South Carolina (it's the width of the playing surface and features a huge video screen).


The University of South Carolina Gamecocks

Ithough head coach Steve Spurrier continues to deny it, rumors of his retirement after only four seasons at USC still circulate. Regardless of whether he opts out of his position after this season or not, the former University of Florida coach, who led the Gators to six SEC titles, does admit he has a lot to accomplish this fall.

The Gamecocks' last season ended with a less-than-glamorous record (7-6), the team having lost their last two regular season games (including a competent defeat by Clemson) and gotten hammered by Iowa in the Outback Bowl 31-10. The complaints were numerous: USC seemed unable to achieve third-down conversions or put up big offensive scoring numbers, resulting in a precipitous drop in the polls, if they were ranked at all. "South Carolina must get production out of quarterback Stephen Garcia—he has so much potential," says the *P&C*'s Gene Sapakoff, referring to the probable starting QB. "I still think he can be a top-of-the-SEC-caliber passer and leader." Spurrier is also beefing up his offensive line with strong recruiting from around the Southeast and has some great returning players, such as senior center Garrett Anderson and Garcia, poised to make things happen.

So, with strong fan support, promising talent, and an experienced coaching staff, can Spurrier pull it all together and recover some face in 2009?

After leading the Florida Gators to six SEC championships, head coach Steve Spurrier took over the helm at USC in 2005. His conference record for his four completed seasons with USC is 15-17. Starting quarterback Stephen Garcia (opposite)








all aboard! Anyone visiting Williams-Brice Stadium will notice the 22 railroad cars that line an old section of track just outside the stadium walls. In the late 1980s, two crafty businessmen, Edward R. Robinson and Carl F. "Doc" Howard, began acquiring and renovating the cabooses and rail spur, inaugurated the "Cockaboose Railroad," to cater to upscale Gamecock tailgaters. In 1990, it took them only two days to sell 20 of the high-end hangouts outfitted with luxurious accoutrements, from built-in stereo systems and wide-screen TVs to mahogany cabinets and marble countertops. Of course, they kept two for themselves. While owners aren't likely to give up their posh digs, when they do come on the market, count on paying some big bucks (read: mid-six figures).



Known For: His Steve Spurrier impersonation. "People always say that I resemble Coach Spurrier. I'm a pretty good mimic so I learned to imitate him fairly well." Ultimate Paraphernalia: A framed newspaper article signed by Steve Spurrier. "A friend and I were at the Clemson-Carolina game one year and hanging out at the Esso Club. I had my visor on and was entertaining a few friends with my Spurrier act when Bob Gillespie of The State walked up. He said that was the best Spurrier impersonation he had ever witnessed. The following season, he wrote about it in a story that came out on the eve of the USC-Florida game in Gainesville. When I met Spurrier a while later and asked him to sign the article, he gave me that quirky look and said, 'Ah, you're that guy!'"

Game-Day Tradition: "Getting to Williams-Brice at least five hours prior to kickoff and visiting with all of the great Gamecock fans I've met over the years. The Murdaugh family from Hampton parks near the team's locker room, and it's always awesome to hang out with them and greet the players after a big win." **Dedication:** "Game day is sacred for me. I usually can't sleep the night before, so I pack the car and get ready to roll. When Saturday morning arrives, I'm like a little kid ready to go on a class trip."

Clemson University Tigers



any Clemson fans left last season more than a bit disappointed. Initially ranked number nine in the country, the Tigers suffered some heartbreaking losses to teams most observers agree should have been gimmes—recall the Wake Forest and Maryland debacles? Couple those with a beating by Florida State; the unceremonious October 2008 departure of head coach Tommy Bowden (personal decision or forced resignation? The jury's still out); and a new coach, Dabo Swinney, taking charge, and the Tigers have a lot of expectations to fulfill.

However, there were some bright spots, including the 31-14 victory over their in-state rivals, the Gamecocks (Clemson leads the 11-yearold rivalry 65-37, with four ties). Add in some impressive stats: The Tigers won four of their last five regular season games, made their fourth consecutive bowl appearance, and were the only ACC team to rank in the top four in both offensive and defensive scoring. "Clemson is going to have to hide its inexperience at quarterback with a stellar pass rush and pass defense, plus the running of C.J. Spiller," notes *P&C* writer Gene Sapakoff. "It's more than possible, but the schedule is tough early, and stumbling out of the gates is never a good idea." And as for Swinney calling the shots? "He showed some good leadership, but he'll have to prove it over two or three seasons, not just a few games."







{ ONES TO WATCH }



The starting sophomore, who ESPN voted as Number One defensive end, is a powerhouse of pass rushing. He had 47 tackles last season (top among defensive linemen) and was one of the main reasons the Tigers were ranked 10th in the nation. He also had six tackles in the Gator Bowl against Nebraska and was named Defensive MVP of the game.



C.J. Spiller

The senior running back is an absolute game-breaker, "with the potential to score anytime he touches the ball," says Sapakoff. With 4,908 all-purpose rushing yards and as the holder of 10 Clemson records (including most touchdown plays of 50 yards or more and six career touchdown plays of 80 yards or more), he promises to continue to do big things this season.





Rock of Ages For years, a mysterious rock sat in head coach Frank Howard's (1940-1969) office, used as a doorstop and all but ignored. Though it was a gift to Howard from a friend who brought it from Death Valley, California, to "Death Valley," South Carolina (the popular name given to Memorial Stadium in the 1940s), Howard ordered that the rock be discarded in 1966. Instead, a clever promoter had it mounted on a pedestal and placed in the middle of the east end zone hill, down which the Clemson football team runs when entering the field for each game. On September 24, 1966, the Tigers ran by the rock for the first time and went on to beat conference rival University of Virginia 40-35.

From then on, Howard used the rock as a motivational tool, declaring "Give me 110 percent or keep your filthy hands off of my rock." Beginning the next season, the team started rubbing the rock on their way down the hill, establishing one of the great traditions in college football and forever immortalizing "Howard's Rock."

FUN FACT: As of the end of the 2008 season, the Tigers have made the run down the hill 327 times.
